

August RPNA Featured Speaker Carl Hetler: City of South Bend Homeless Coordinator

You see them almost everyday. Standing on the street corner with a cardboard sign. Laying down on a bench. Sleeping in a doorway. How does it make you feel? What do you think should be done?

I had the opportunity to speak to the River Park Neighborhood Association in August. We started by thinking about what thoughts and feelings we have to the word "home." This helped us think about the benefits we enjoy and what we want all residents to experience. I shared about our goals for the City: to help people find the resources they need for food, shelter and support, and to create a caring community. You can learn more on our website www.southbendin.gov/homeless.

We discussed concerns about how to best help people, the different levels of shelter in our community, and new construction going on to provide more affordable and low-income housing. I shared statistics on what causes people to experience homelessness and how successful we've been providing housing and services such as recovery from substance use and addressing mental health issues. I finished by talking about different ways to help, from donations, to volunteering, to getting to know someone struggling. Please reach out to me if you want to know more and get involved!

About 30 churches organize a March for Jesus every year. This year they selected River Park to be its epicenter.

Approximately 200 walkers gathered on Saturday, August 17th, in the IU South Bend parking lot to begin four circular routes around River Park.

They marched in the pattern of a clover leaf, ending up at Potawatomi Park at noon in time for the annual *Party in the Park*. A fifth route coming from Notre Dame served as a stem for the clover pattern. The idea was in some fashion to honor the Fighting Irish logo.

There was a lot of enthusiasm. Realtor Diane Bennett, who got her start with some assistance from the River Park Neighborhood Association's *Housing and Asset Preservation Committee*, was one of its facilitators.

Even though there was some light rain about 1,000 parents and their children enjoyed the many activity booths and free food in the park that Saturday afternoon.

Lead Affinity Group Presentation By DeAndre Barton

At our May River Park Neighborhood Association meeting, Heidi Beidinger from the Lead Affinity Group came to speak with us about preventing lead exposure in our homes. Exposure to lead causes learning disabilities that look like ADHD in children and a wide variety of health problems in adults.

As most of the homes in River Park were built before 1928, they are a potential lead risk. The Lead Affinity Group works with Notre Dame to mulch homes and get homes tested for lead.

Lead is a naturally occurring element in everyday life but older homes have risks inside and outside. Paint used to contain lead, and the chips of paint taste sweet to children. Dust in the home may include lead. Take care sanding painted surfaces which can put dust into the air. Outside, if pea gravel and mulch are put down to cover soil, then you can avoid lead exposure. Encapsulating paint is a good way to seal the lead in.

There are other ways to prevent lead poisoning. We learned that good habits help, like eating good nutritional food, washing our hands before eating, and cleaning horizontal surfaces once a week. It is best to get any children tested for lead with the Department of Health. We learned that the Indiana Department of Health requires the testing of 1- and 2-year-olds to verify no lead exposure, although not all children are tested. Zero is the only safe level of lead.

The Lead Affinity Group offers home testing kits, and our own River Park Library is a collection center. You can pick up a kit from the library and drop it off right there. Keep your family safe.












