2024-25 Organization of Housing and Safety Committees By Phil Niswonger

Initially the River Park Neighborhood Association Housing & Asset Preservation and Safety Committees were united. Improving neighborhoods also reduces crime. Yet, because their work was more detailed, they divided into two committees in 2013. The value of these two committees over the last 20 years is inestimable.

Since the main effort of the Safety Committee was through the now discontinued Neighborhood Crime Watch program, and since the Housing & Asset Preservation Committee has been dormant since COVID, we will now reunite them for the shared purpose of improving housing in River Park.

The Housing & Asset Preservation Committee was successful in repairing many homes, both via its own efforts and through connections with First Source Bank and Rebuilding Together.

It has sponsored the annual River Park Spring Clean Up and railroad cleanup projects. It developed close relationships with South Bend's Code Enforcement and the city's Redevelopment Commission.

We will have prizes for the top three finalists. Have your decorations up by December 7th, and our judges will review them by December 16th .


JoinUp! South Bend

It's finally finished! River Park has completed their 2023 Ignite Grant. The grant paid for wrapping up 5 signal boxes in River Park in photographs from our history. As you come across the corners of Mishawaka Avenue, Twychenham Drive, Ironwood Drive, Pleasant Street and 30th Street, please do take your time to admire the photos celebrating River Park.

At the corner of Twychenham Drive and Mishawaka Avenue, you will see the logo of River Park. Across from IU South Bend, you will see the signal box wrapped with pictures of the zoo. 

They offer memberships that allow access to the whole makerspace and lots of materials. If you do not want to commit to a membership, they also offer day passes so people can go in and see if they like it there.

If you are interested in buying local goods, you can walk into the store and be greeted with lots of wonderful things for sale. They sell South Bend T-shirts, local art, postcards, candles, soap and even beard oils. They have a very nice studio supplied with everything you need where you can do activities like painting, crocheting, knitting, jewelry making, candle making, soap making, pottery and more.

River Park Plan Update By DeAndre Barton

The River Park Neighborhood Association's November meeting was dedicated to viewing the City of South Bend's updated River Park Neighborhood Plan. On November 14th we met at Gospel Center Missionary Church to listen to Tim Corcoran from the city. The city is working to get more public engagement for its planning process.

The biggest news from the update was what the city wants to do with Nuner field. The area of Nuner Field is already zoned for housing since there is no zoning type for school owned land. The big news: the City of South Bend has talked with the South Bend Community School Corporation, and SBCSC has no plan to sell the field and the city has no plans to buy it. If the school corporation decides to sell, the city has a plan in place. Asked if some one else could buy it, Tim said if anyone who is not with the city bought it, then they could build on the whole field.

If the school corporation were to sell and the city bought the land, the city would split the property down the middle and zone the south part of it as open space. It would be called Nuner Green and it would be a 2.2 acre City Park. It would add city recognized open space to the east side of South Bend. Tim said that it would have a soccer field, a walking track, a playground, community garden, pavilion, and additional trees and seating. The north half could include different housing types for smaller households, which would create a greater population to support the Mishawaka Avenue businesses.

Nuner field updates and explanations were not the only updates. There has been a change with IU South Bend plans because of how IU Bloomington would like them to have these plans. The city's plans now include Wall Street from Ironwood to Logan. They want a shared use path for pedestrians cross Ironwood safer. They have some ideas, like pedestrian flashers and an island, but there is nothing concrete at the moment. Tim said that they are focused on Wall Street and Greenlawn improvements when it comes to Potawatomi Park Plans.

The date for the updated Potawatomi Park Plan hasn't been set, but the neighborhood Association will keep you updated. To review the updated plans, go to together.southbemdin.gov, choose Neighborhood Planning, then select the link for River Park.




Avenue Bicycle Station By Colin Christy
